### Grades....GPA......Rigor......Transcript...... AP's, IB's, Honors... What does it all mean?

When it comes to college applications, the most important elements have remained the same for the last 10+ years. Research by the National Association for College Admissions Counseling (NACAC) shows that colleges weight the following factors most heavily:

- **overall GPA-** A student's grade point average (GPA) is fairly self-explanatory: the higher the GPA, the better.
- grades in college preparatory coursework (e.g., AP and Honors courses)
- strength of curriculum (i.e., course rigor)

#### Why does curriculum strength matter? It indicates two important qualities to college admissions officers:

- the student actively seeks out academic challenges
- the student succeeds in these rigorous courses by getting good grades



## Factors that Colleges Consider when Reviewing a Potential Student

### **GRADES** (most important!)

- Transcript- Final grades from all classes taken during your high school career, and sometimes your
- Regents' exam scores.
- The strength of your course load- colleges want to see that you have been challenging yourself.

#### **SCORES**

Scores from the SAT and/or ACT

### **INTERVIEW PERFORMANCE**

• Some colleges may request an interview with an admissions representative, local alumni or a liaison from the community. Most are just a formality/courtesy. Notes are added to the application package.

### **DEMONSTRATED INTEREST**

 This is documented interest that the student has shown in the college (campus visitation, e-mail correspondence, etc.).



### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Two academic teachers.
- One from your school counselor.

### **EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES**

Sports, clubs, and other activities.

#### **SPECIAL TALENTS**

Brag about yourself! Tell them about any talents you have.



### **Develop Extracurricular Interests**

 Extracurricular interests enable students to discover their talents and skills in athletic, artistic, academic, community service, and other areas.

 Extracurricular interests build confidence, create an identity, and encourage students to see the relationship between the classroom and the world around them.



## College Planning by Grade Level: 11th grade

- Make a list of your abilities and preferences.
- Start thinking about what you want to study in college.
- Go through FHS curriculum guide to see if we offer electives and courses to confirm your in
- Learn about colleges. Look into websites, scheduling visits and start taking inventory about what you like and what you don't like (ex. Urban vs Rural setting).
- Visit the Guidance Office to familiarize yourself with the resources available to you.

- Create a college specific email and digital file to stay organized.
- Estimate your financial aid need; speak as a family about what is affordable.
- Sign up for SAT's or ACT"s for the Spring through Collegeboard.org or ACT. org.
- Never to early to look into scholarships!
- Have a Post-Secondary Conference with your School Counselor
- Develop a list of 15-20 colleges that are of interest to you.
- Get involved in internships and extra curricular activities
- Schedule college visits!





## College Planning by Grade Level: 9th and 10th Grade

- Create a four year high school plan- think about course selection, rigor, aligning electives with careers and interests.
- Every grade that is posted on your transcript counts- make sure that you do the best you can academically as it all gets factored into your GPA.
- Continuously meet with your School Counselor- the more they know you the more they can guide you through this process based on you!
- Get involved in extracurricular activities- it is not about how many activities you do, rather it is
  the level of involvement and demonstrating commitment that colleges are looking for.
- Never to early to look into scholarships and saving for colleges
- Explore Summer Programs- Look for a job, internship or volunteer position that will help you learn about a field of interest.

### **Test Optional is an Option**

•More and more four-year colleges and universities do not use the SAT or ACT to admit substantial numbers of bachelor-degree applicants.

### **How School Counselors Help**

- Provide a series of activities designed to: Learn about the student (we start in 9th grade with individual student meetings)
- Help students learn about themselves
  - Explore interests, aptitudes and potential careers
- Monitor achievement and progress in the classroom
- Identify individual learning concerns and find solutions
- Provide a series of workshops designed to help students explore postsecondary options.
- Review PSAT results and create a standardized testing timeline
- Conduct workshops for 11th graders in the winter of junior year to start the college search process
- Individual spring college meetings with juniors & families

- Get familiar with our website: FHS Guidance Page
- Check your students' grades and attendance regularly through the Parent Portal
- Regular Attendance is crucial to student success
- Enroll in Schoology for each Class of ... where counselors share updates about a wide-range of opportunities (i.e. enrichment programs, college visits, scholarships and internships etc.)
- Make sure to enroll in ParentSquare for announcement and information
- Take advantage of this time to go on College visits both in person and virtual options are available
- Utilize Naviance to explore college entrance requirements as well as college application requirements/deadlines
- Have honest conversations with your child about what the family's expectations are regarding post-secondary attendance
