THE FORTITUDE OF FARMINGDALE

For school districts around the world, the pandemic caused a major change in the ways students learn. Farmingdale School District met the challenges of this new form of learning head-on. Now students learn both in-person and virtually, and knowledge they acquire in the classroom can be utilized in the real world in new and topical ways.

The introduction of the “Schoolology” platform in the fall of 2020 helped the Farmingdale School District create and maintain an efficient form of communication among students, teachers, and families. With the stroke of a few keys and the click of a button, parents are able to view the assignments and progress of their children. By providing access to these resources, the Farmingdale School District is able to ensure that teachers can continue to seamlessly offer an engaging educational experience and parents remain informed of their child’s progress. Creating this one-stop-shop for educators allows them to collaborate more effectively and share approaches and ideas. Ongoing daily support for teachers, students, and families with Schoolology, and all technology-related issues during remote learning, continues to be provided in accordance with the District’s longstanding efforts to always put students’ needs first. Our teachers have been working above and beyond to learn the new platform while tackling the challenges of virtual learning. They are participating in professional development workshops led by staff developers and also building collegial circles with each other in order to learn and grow with best teaching practices. The Remote Learning Teacher Resource guide provided several tutorials for platforms such as Schoolology, Google Meets, and Flipgrid to ensure teachers are proficient in the use of all platforms.



Being engaged members of their classes has allowed students to bring their ideas to life. In an effort to fortify safety measures, the District administration worked around the clock, along with Farmingdale High School Technology Department and Maintenance, to design and produce desk divider reinforcements. Students chipped in as well! Mr. Sterler’s Wood Materials Processing Classes and Mr. Bilello’s Vocational Carpentry Classes processed over 40,000 linear feet of PVC material needed to provide the reinforcements for over 8,000 desks in the school district as part of the “Shield Project”. The additions to desk dividers not only ensured the safety of both students and faculty, but provided students with the chance to see their education meet real-world application.

From inside Woodward Parkway Elementary School, our teachers continue to provide students with engaging learning experiences, both in person and virtually! The integration of Schoolology and virtual tutorials of how to use the innovative learning platform have prepared our youngest students for this particular chapter of their academic journey. Teachers are committed to providing moments of educational and social-emotional support—both inside and outside the classroom.

Additionally, morning meetings are being conducted for all students in order to cultivate a sense of community. By participating in this new morning ritual—which covers morning routines, what makes someone a hero, and recognizing the people in our lives that inspire us—a sense of normalcy is created for our remote students.

RUSS CATANZARO - CLASS OF 1970

Mr. Russ Catanzaro, a licensed electrician by trade, serves as a construction project manager for Gannon Vitolo Contracting LLC. Mr. Catanzaro is tasked with overseeing multiple projects with valuations exceeding several million dollars. Mr. Catanzaro, referred to by many as “Mr. Farmingdale”, has a deep love and commitment to Farmingdale, evidenced by the work he does within the community. He has served in the roles of both vice president and president of the Farmingdale Police Athletic League (PAL) for the past 25 years, and is a past recipient of the Nassau County PAL Volunteer Award. During his 12 years as a trustee of the Farmingdale Board of Education, Mr. Catanzaro was integral in ensuring that district-wide construction projects were completed safely, accurately, and within budget. Such improvements included replacement of all boilers and windows in the district as well as renovations to Farmingdale High School’s bathrooms and locker rooms.

CHRISTINE LATHURAS - CLASS OF 1980*

Dr. Christine Lathuras graduated from Farmingdale High School as a four-time Athlete of the Year recipient. She earned her undergraduate degree at Hofstra University, where she was recruited and attended on a basketball scholarship. Dr. Lathuras then attended the University of Maryland School of Dentistry, Gray School of Medicine and is now a practicing dentist. Dr. Lathuras currently provides free dental care locally and has traveled to over fifteen countries to provide dental services to the underserved. In addition, she has taught emergency dental procedures to medical providers in refugee camps in Africa. Evidence of her exceptional work is memorialized in the accolades she has been awarded and the incredible work she continues to do. Most notably, Dr. Lathuras was the recipient of the Waterbury Chamber of Commerce Leadership Award, American Dental Association Volunteer Recognition Award and participates in the Milford Rotary, School of the World. Her donations contributed to four schools being built in rural Guatemala. Additionally, Dr. Lathuras volunteers at the Beth El Center, where she prepares and serves food to the homeless. Dr. Lathuras has often been quoted saying, “We don’t do dentistry, we change lives.”

CHRISTA LUCARELLI - CLASS OF 1987

Following her graduation from Farmingdale High School in 1987, Ms. Christa Lucarelli attended and graduated from Molloy College in 1991 with a B.S. in Education. Ms. Lucarelli then went on to earn her Master in Library Sciences from Queen’s College. Upon completion of her graduate studies, Ms. Lucarelli returned to the Farmingdale community and began working for the Farmingdale Library, the same place she worked during her time as a young Farmingdale School District student. Her work began in the library’s children’s service area in 1991, and in 2002, she was named head of the children’s service department. As head of the department, Ms. Lucarelli established all of the children’s programs offered at the library, ranging from infants to high school-aged children. Ms. Lucarelli assumed the role of assistant director in 2010. One of Ms. Lucarelli’s most notable accomplishments as assistant director was her development and implementation of her “Triple P Program”—a program in which students volunteer every week to participate and spend time with their peers with special needs. This inspiring program has attracted over 70 participants since its inception. For her work in establishing Triple P, Ms. Lucarelli received the Town of Oyster Bay Award for the Creator of the Peer Pal Program (Triple P) at the Farmingdale Public Library.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN OUR SCHOOLS

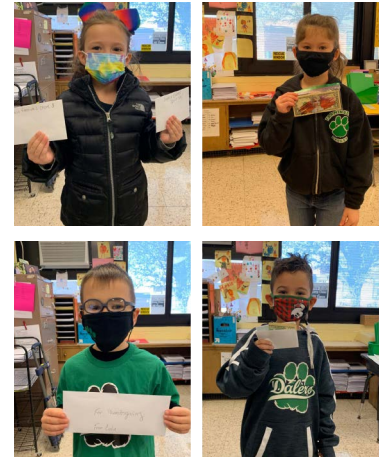
Albany Avenue Elementary School

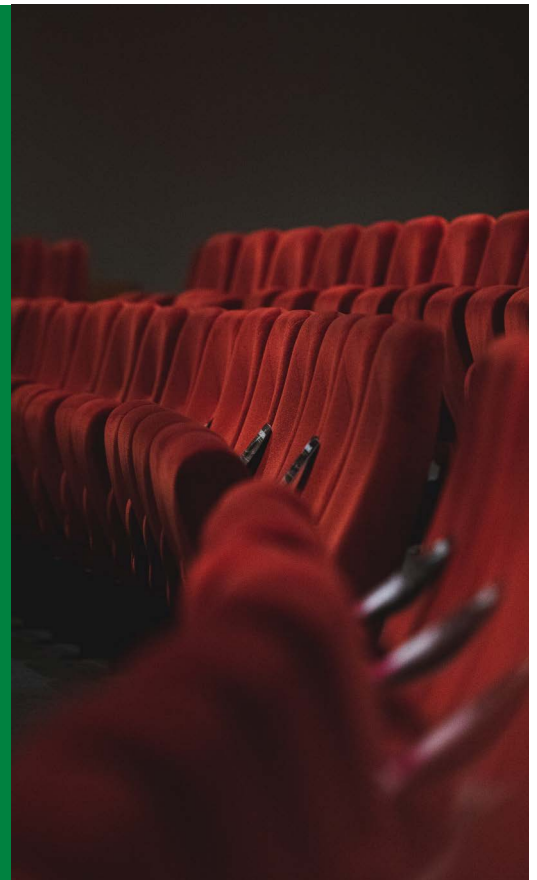

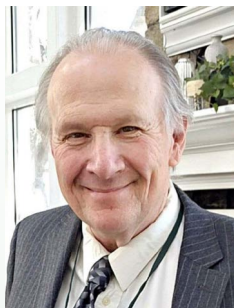

A LEGACY THAT STILL RIDES PROUDLY



Although Joseph Williams Jr.—the transportation specialist for the Farmingdale School District—passed away in February of 2019, the legacy he leaves behind can still be felt today. In recognition of his incomparable role as a member of the Farmingdale School District, Mr. Williams has been posthumously inducted into the

New York Association for Pupil Transportation’s (NYAPT) Hall of Fame. Each year, NYAPT selects one individual who upholds its mission of supporting, developing, and representing professionals who are responsible for the safe and efficient transportation of our school children for this honor. Joe’s exemplary track record embodies all that an honoree must possess.

In May of 2000, Mr. Williams began his tenure at the District and stepped into his role of providing safe

transportation for thousands of students to and from school every day. It was a role he met with a sense of great responsibility and determination. Throughout his time as Farmingdale School District’s transportation specialist, Joe was in the driver’s seat. Overseeing the routing of the District’s buses, implementing bus safety drills, and being responsible for preventative maintenance inspections on all District vehicles, Joe truly did it all. Additionally, he was responsible for spearheading the development of the District’s satellite-mapping program, which prepares bus routes for every student in the District. As an active member of the Farmingdale community, Mr. Williams engaged in a number of committees and took part in workshops and conferences in order to stay literate on all emerging school bus laws. As a strong proponent for legislation regarding bus safety, Joe attended several State Education Department advisory committee meetings and participated in NYAPT’s Lobby Day, the association honoring Joe with this honor.
