A Message From Your Board of Education

Dear Friends:

In preparation for the 2010-11 school year, the Board of Education worked throughout the summer to identify a comprehensive list of our shared principles, beliefs and ultimate mission as educators. The result was the establishment of a formal goal toward which the Farmingdale School District will strive in the months and years ahead:

We acknowledge that there are certain basic principles that shall guide the Board of Education in its actions and activities on behalf of our students and our community.

The mission of the Farmingdale School District is to educate our students to become independent thinkers and problem solvers. It is our goal to empower each student to meet the challenges of tomorrow's emerging world. The district will provide a safe, nurturing environment in which individual and civic responsibility is fostered, diversity is respected and all students are enabled to realize their full potential. To that end, we will:

Establish Farmingdale as a high-achieving school district, as evidenced by high levels of student performance in all areas including New York State assessments and Regents exams.

This summer was a busy one for our entire administration and staff. Throughout the district, we worked hard painting, cleaning, polishing and rearranging the furniture to prepare for the opening of school.

The central administrative offices have been relocated to the Grant Avenue wing of Weldon E. Howitt Middle School. The Board Room and the middle school main office have moved to the Van Cott Avenue entrance by the flagpole, where new handicapped access is provided. These changes should lead to a much improved flow within Howitt Middle School.

Other summer projects throughout the district included classroom renovations and the installation of two new life skills rooms. The Howitt Middle School gymnasium floors were refinished, and the ceiling tile- and light-replacement work has continued. A new staff parking lot has been created at the back of Howitt to relieve congestion at the front of the building.

We have new staff members among us, as well. We know that you will help us to welcome the new principal of the Woodward Parkway Elementary School, Patrick Klocek, and the new director of mathematics, Nancy Lin. They have been working with our administrative team all summer preparing for the return of our students.

We're excited about the progress our students will make in the coming months, and we hope you will be too.

New Faces in the District

The Farmingdale School District is proud to welcome two new administrators for the 2010-11 school year.



Patrick Klocek joins the Farmingdale family as the new principal of Woodward Parkway Elementary School. Since 2006, Mr. Klocek has served as assistant principal at P.S./I.S. 178 in Jamaica Estates, Queens. During his four years there, he worked closely with the principal to enhance students' educational experiences while also supervising the installation of middle school grades into what was previously an elementary school. Mr. Klocek began his career as a third- and fourth-grade teacher at P.S. 173 in Fresh Meadows. He holds a bachelor's degree in elementary education from St. John's University and a master's degree and professional diploma in reading and school district administration from Long Island University.

"I firmly believe that teaching is the most fun and rewarding profession that one can choose," Mr. Klocek said. "I consider myself truly fortunate that I can say that I love what I do for a living."



Nancy Lin is the district's new director of mathematics for grades K-12. A former school administrator in New York City, Ms. Lin began her career as an elementary school teacher and later spent six years teaching secondary school mathematics. In 2001, her students and principal nominated her for Disney's Teacher of the Year award. Ms. Lin received her B.A. from Columbia University, where she graduated cum laude. She received her M.A. in instructional technology and media from Columbia's Teachers College, followed by state certification as a school administrator from Hunter College. As a lifelong learner, she is currently pursuing her doctorate in math, science and technology at the CUNY Graduate Center.

Ms. Lin counts among her unique talents the ability to solve a Rubik's Cube in less than five minutes. "If anyone has a Rubik's Cube that needs to be fixed, feel free to bring it to my office," she said.

The New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA) recently honored Farmingdale High School as a School of Distinction for having all 28 of its varsity sports teams recognized as scholar/athlete teams during the 2009-10 school year. A scholar/athlete team must maintain a combined grade-point average of at least 90 percent during its sport season. Every one of Farmingdale's teams achieved that goal last year. In addition, our girls' lacrosse and boys' tennis teams were named scholar/athlete state champions for earning the highest GPA's in their sports out of all New York State teams. They are the latest of 10 teams from Farmingdale to earn this distinction since 2004.

She will train with the team throughout the year in hopes of representing the United States at the quadrennial Federation of International Lacrosse (FIL) Under-19 World Championship, which will take place next summer in Hannover, Germany.
