Among the Benefits of the New **Common Core: An Exciting Approach** to Math for Every Learner

This school year, teachers across the District are using new approaches to math based on the latest research and practice. The Math in Focus program provides interactive lessons that include model drawing, and "mental" math, for example — strategies that have been shown to develop higherlevel thinking and help students make sense of math. Schools that have used these methods have found that students learn far more than "how to get the answer"; they are able to grasp mathematical concepts more easily and apply them to real-world situations.

The Math in Focus program is also paced in such a way that students are able to dig into each topic more deeply, rather than being exposed to many topics in quick succession with only a brief time to grasp the material before moving ahead. One of the greatest strengths of this program is that it allows for different learning rates and styles, so that every child can experience success.

The Math in Focus program is consistent with the new Common Core Standards, designed to address the ways teachers teach and students learn in order to ensure that, upon graduation, our children have the knowledge and skills to be successful in college and careers. Developed at the national level, the Common Core Standards (for both mathematics and literacy) are based on input from leaders in both education and business, and draw on the most effective models from across the country and the world. The core curriculum changes are being integrated into schools across the United States to ensure consistency in education, from grade to grade and from school to school.

To prepare for these instructional shifts, Farmingdale teachers and administrators executed a pilot program at the Northside Elementary School in 2009-10 school year. Elementary schools

Districtwide fully adopted the K-2 program in 2011.

A Message From Your Board of Education

The Farmingdale Board of Education would like to take this opportunity to welcome everyone back to school. We hope that you enjoyed the summer and are ready for an exciting year.

Every summer, the Farmingdale School District Board and administration meet to discuss important issues concerning our students' needs. As always, a priority this past summer was to ensure a safe environment that is conducive to student learning.

In other developments, high school renovations have included the guidance, psychology and deans' office spaces, making them more accessible to our students and their families. A complete middle school auditorium renovation is underway. Window projects are planned for the Howitt Middle School, Albany Avenue and Saltzman East Memorial Elementary schools, along with many small building projects to enhance the learning environment.

In terms of academic advances, the Common Core math curriculum using Singapore strategies was introduced last year in Kindergarten. This year, it will be implemented in grades three through five. The Response to Intervention Program that began last year at the elementary schools will expand to the middle school this year. In addition, the new evaluation system initiated last year for all ELA and math teachers in grades three through eight will be implemented for all administrators, teachers and pupil personnel staff this school year.

Plans are underway for full implementation of the Dignity for All Students Act with coordinators in each school to plan staff training and respond to any questions or concerns from students and families. Our Dignity Act coordinators, as well as a newly developed Student Bullying Prevention and Intervention Policy and our Code of Conduct, are all posted on the District website: www.farmingdaleschools.org.

In an effort to optimize nutrition and promote healthy lifestyles, the Farmingdale School District joins those across the country in serving up a new and improved lunch menu to its students this year. The revised menu, available in all cafeterias throughout the District, offers a broader variety of healthful meal options that align with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's school meal regulations.

What's Happening in Our Schools

Albany Avenue

Northside

Approximately 200 students, parents and siblings — some even joined by their pets — filled the sidewalks surrounding Northside Elementary School in early October to celebrate *International Walk to School Month*. These families made the choice to walk to school as a way to promote exercise as part of the Wellness Committee's program. Saltzman East Memorial

The children in Christine Linsalata's kindergarten class participated in a reading and writing workshop to learn kindergarten power words "I" and "can." Students were paired with classmates to read their *I Can* books. These books allow the children to practice and gain confidence as readers. Students in the class expressed their excitement for reading by saying things such as "Now, I can read to my baby brother," and "I am proud that I am a reader." As part of this exercise, students practice their reading exercises at home as well.





Howitt Middle School

To begin the school year, Howitt Middle School students reconnected with each other at the PTA's Meet and Greet in September, an event that allowed children to welcome new Howitt classmates as well. At the Meet and Greet, students danced to a live DJ and played games while the PTA served drinks and snacks. Parents and families were given the opportunity to meet one another while receiving important information on the new school year from administrators.

Woodward Parkway

Fifth grade students in Kerry Miltenberg's class have enhanced their understanding of the scientific method by conducting their own experiments with paper airplanes. Ms. Miltenberg infused math, literacy and fun into the science lesson. The students considered the variables, which included the weight of the paper used, the shape and design of the planes and the velocity at which the planes were thrown. After constructing the planes, the students flew their creations across the classroom to observe flight patterns and estimated the distance traveled. The fifth graders wrote summaries of their findings after the experiment was complete.





Farmingdale High School

In September, more than 800 Farmingdale High School seniors and their parents participated in a forum on driving safety. Representatives from the Nassau County District Attorney's Office and the Nassau County Police Department discussed the dangers of texting and driving, as well as driving while intoxicated. To understand the impact of irresponsible driving, high schoolers heard personal accounts from convicted motorists who were devastated by the consequences of their actions. Students also engaged in a mock arrest and a field sobriety test.

A Record Number of Farmingdale Students Earn Prestigious All-State Designation

A total of 16 Farmingdale students were selected to perform in the New York State School Music Association (NYSSMA) All-State Festival this year. These outstanding musicians, including 15 ensemble musicians and one alternate, represent the highest number of Farmingdale High School students ever selected for this distinguished event.

Each year, NYSSMA sponsors approximately 145 solo and ensemble festivals in New York State, where students are evaluated on their performances. Rating levels range from one through six, with six being the most difficult. Many students start this evaluation process in fifth or sixth grade. For each level, the music is more demanding; students are judged on all aspects of performance, including tone quality, technique, musicianship, interpretation, musicality, dynamics and sight reading ability.

By 10th grade, they become eligible to compete for the All-State audition if they have achieved outstanding proficiency on level six. The All-State competition is rigorous; students from across New York State compete for a spot in the festival, with only the most talented and skilled performers being chosen. These students perform before an adjudicator who issues a score and evaluation sheet; then the judges make a recommendation to the state committee. Students also need recommendations from their ensemble director, music administrator and high school principal.

Receiving the nomination to All-State is an extremely high honor, but being accepted only marks the beginning of much preparation. Students receive their music in October and must learn it by December, when they participate in intense rehearsals for three days, followed by the All-State concerts and culminating in the annual state conference. Farmingdale High School is most proud of its All-State students and alternates.
