The goal of the Farmingdale public schools is to establish ourselves as a high-achieving school District, as evidenced by high levels of student performance in all areas, including New York State assessments and Regents exams.

Districtwide Assessment Program at Farmingdale

Testing, as it relates to the public school system, has become to many a controversial issue. Many parents, and even some educators, wince at the mention of it, resistant to the notion that the ability and education level of a student can be adequately determined from a series of standardized tests. This growing perception, especially since the introduction of the Common Core Standards, needs to be tempered against the benefits of these tests. Assessments can lead to more appropriate, student-specific curriculum. Uniform testing can help identify students with specific learning and behavioral needs, ensuring that these students receive the proper, individualized attention.

In order to provide the best possible education for our students, the Farmingdale School District is putting in place a Districtwide assessment program. The results of this program will enable us to more easily recognize common problem areas for students, and then create a curriculum tailored to these problems.

One of the central arguments against standardized testing is that it often monopolizes weeks of class time and causes considerable stress for students. This is certainly a legitimate concern. To reduce substantial disruptions to regular class time, we have designed many of the assessments in our program as short, stress-free tests. However, the benefits of even these short assessments are significant; a few minutes to gauge a student's reading level can provide a starting point from which to develop an appropriate and rewarding reading curriculum.

Assessments are essential because without them what we would have is a one-size-fits-all education. This is exactly what the educators in Farmingdale do not want, and we recognize that it does not provide the education you expect for your children. Assessments allow us to remedy this by identifying learning differences among students. When a child is opted out of these tests, which is certainly a parent's right, our ability to deliver the most effective educational program for that student is compromised.

How do these assessments benefit students?

- The Mathematical Concepts and Applications (M-CAP) test, a tenminute assessment that gauges the general mathematical problemsolving skills expected in grades 2-8.
- An oral reading fluency test, in which students read aloud for one minute while the teacher records the number of correct words read per minute.
- K-2-specific lessons such as letternaming fluency, letter-sound fluency, number identification and number comprehension.

A Message From Your Board of Education

The 2013-14 school year is well underway, and the holiday season is already fast approaching. Our students have been hard at work, and we can all be confident that this will be another exciting school year.

In the 2012-13 school year, the state introduced new assessments for ELA and mathematics. As with all change, the introduction of the Common Core standards and the new state tests presented significant challenges. From the start, the State Education Department (SED) advised school districts across the region that the assessment scores were likely to decrease before they increase. The reason for the temporary dip, explained SED representatives, is that there was insufficient time between the implementation of the new standards and the administration of these assessments for students to prepare adequately.

These predictions were accurate; however, we know that these results do not accurately reflect our students' knowledge and abilities. While we will use this information to enhance preparation in our classrooms, it's critical to remember that new Common Core standards were implemented because *the former standards did not adequately prepare students for the 21st Century*. We are confident that Farmingdale students are continuing on an upward path to success, and we are committed to doing everything possible to ensure that this is so.

The 2012-13 academic campaign was a landmark year in terms of implementing new programs, and we saw several important academic advancements as well. The Response to Intervention Program was expanded to the middle school level, and the new evaluation system was applied to all administrators, teachers and pupil personnel. In addition, math teachers Districtwide began utilizing the new *Math in Focus* program in kindergarten through grade two. The program, which is aligned with the new Common Core standards, is a series of math lessons designed to develop higher-level thinking and help students better understand difficult math problems. The program was successful in helping our students grasp, and apply, the real-world applications of mathematical concepts.

Another achievement last year was the District's full implementation of the Dignity for All Students Act. Dignity Act coordinators were present in each school to hold staff training and listen to questions and concerns from students and families. We also developed progressive student bullying prevention and intervention programs. Furthermore, to promote good nutrition and healthy lifestyles, Farmingdale joined districts all over the nation in offering a new and improved student lunch menu. The revised menu, available in all cafeterias throughout the District, offers a broader variety of healthful meal options that align with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's school meal regulations. Programs such as each of these underscore a major tenet of the Farmingdale School District and your Board of Education: unwavering commitment to student health and safety.

During the summer, several areas at the high school were entirely reconstructed. They include both cafeterias, the health office, the adult education office, the office of the director of academic and technical studies, the wrestling room, as well as a room for our robotics team, a graphic arts room and 10 other classrooms. Also, the much-needed renovations in the high school bathrooms were completed for the opening of school. At our elementary and middle schools, we have refurbished and/or installed computer labs in preparation for the upcoming electronic assessment requirements. A majority of the work was completed by our own in-house staff, saving our financial resources for other student programs.

We value your involvement and input, and we ask that all parents and other community members become and remain active in District meetings, committees and events. We encourage you to get to know your children's teachers and participate in monthly PTA and Board of Education meetings, all of which are listed on the District calendar. We continue to believe that a major strength of the Farmingdale School District is our ability to work cooperatively and respectfully together. In that spirit, we wish each of you a successful and rewarding year.



Reminder: Register for Basic STAR Exemption

The Farmingdale School District reminds residents of the new Basic STAR exemption registration procedures established by the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance. Residents who currently receive the exemption must register with the state's tax department in order to receive it again in 2014 and beyond.

The new registration procedures are designed to protect residents against inappropriate and fraudulent STAR exemptions. Fortunately, Farmingdale residents need not reregister every year; the tax department will confirm a homeowner's STAR eligibility for future years.

The state will mail instructions on how to register to every resident who currently receives an exemption. The easiest way for homeowners to register is to log on to www.tax.ny.gov or call (518) 457-2036. Residents may continue to register through December 31, 2013.

What Are the Assessments?

Students in kindergarten through second grade will also be taking the *Fundations* language assessment, a program that focuses on print knowledge, alphabet awareness, phonological awareness, vocabulary, fluency and spelling.

Additionally, elementary students will be taking a reading benchmark assessment. Students are assigned reading-level-appropriate books for individual reading. This assessment will help determine students' reading comprehension, while providing teachers with valuable feedback regarding which books are most appropriate and beneficial for each individual student.

Farmingdale is joining with districts across the country in utilizing the innovative and award-winning *Aimsweb* program to administer several of these tests. *Aimsweb* is a complete, web-based solution for universal screening, progress monitoring, and data management for grades K-12. *Aimsweb* tests are specifically designed to provide accurate, continuous and direct student assessment. The results of these tests can be used to modify curriculum, as well as tangibly demonstrate student improvement.

Farmingdale is committed to utilizing emerging technology to accentuate the testing program. Students in grades 3-8 will be using a state-of-the-art computer testing system called Measure of Academic Progress, or MAP, that adapts to the student in real time as the test progresses. MAP works by asking an initial age-appropriate question, and then adjusting the questions based on the student's response. All questions correlate to Common Core Standards.

These assessments help us ensure an education that meets each individual student's needs. Rather than a one-size-fits-all curriculum, students will receive a comprehensive, multifaceted education that reflects the diverse skill levels found in each of our classrooms.
