The 2014-15 school year is three months old, and we here in the Farmingdale School District have much to be proud of. As you can read about here in the pages of *Our Schools*, two Farmingdale High School seniors have advanced to the highly exclusive semifinal portion of the National Merit Scholarship Program, 11 high school music students have been selected for all-state and all-national performing groups, and our varsity sports teams have helped FHS – for the fifth consecutive year – earn Scholar/Athlete School of Distinction accreditation. Accomplishments such as these are testament to the dedication of our students and the exceptional qualifications of our teachers.

As we celebrate our accomplishments, we also look for ways to continuously improve. We touched on the topic of growth mindset in the spring edition of this newsletter. As we embrace a growth mindset, teachers are finding more opportunities to guide and motivate students, encouraging them to remain persistent, resilient and focused on the process of learning. This philosophy stresses the importance of feedback as a fundamental step in the educational experience. Teachers make the focus on learning clear through lesson-learning targets and communicate clearly a confidence in all students' learning ability. Through this approach, students are encouraged to monitor their own learning and set goals; reminding them along the way that with effort and the support of their teachers and parents, they all can achieve.

In a continuing effort to enhance our learning environment, several facility projects Districtwide began over the summer months. These projects included window and curtain-wall replacements and work in the courtyard at Weldon E. Howitt Middle School, window and curtain-wall replacements and energy-performance work at Stanley D. Saltzman Elementary School, new doors and locks Districtwide, renovation at the main office of Farmingdale High School, cameras and frontentry security systems Districtwide, and other smaller facility projects across the District. These various projects will enhance the learning environment for all students.

We value your involvement and input, and we ask that all parents and other community members become and remain active in District meetings, committees and events. We encourage you to get to know your children's teachers and participate in monthly PTA and Board of Education meetings, all of which are listed on the District calendar. FHS Students Work to Raise Funds for AHRC

The goal of the AHRC is to improve the lives of people with developmental disabilities. It accomplishes this goal by providing a variety of services, including rehabilitation, guardianship and educational programs. Since Nassau County's chapter was founded 65 years ago, more than 2,200 people have received assistance.

One way in which the AHRC raises funds for its services is through events such as its annual walkathon. Farmingdale High School has a long



history of participating in the walkathon, and for nine years running, the school has been the top fundraiser in Nassau. It's a testament to the hard work and compassion of our students that FHS continues to be successful in this event. In addition to the walkathon, AHRC also hosts an annual t-shirt contest. The contest requires contestants to design a shirt incorporating the AHRC logo and depict the concept of people helping people. Students from FHS have won the t-shirt contest two years running.

As gratifying as it is to see our students succeeding in the various fundraising events, the true spirit of the day was to help people with developmental disabilities living in the county. We are proud that our students understand their responsibility to the community and set a wonderful example for our District.

Facilities Upgrades at Farmingdale School District

Pictured here are our new, energy-efficient windows at Weldon E. Howitt Middle School. These windows were built using funds from the District's capital reserve that was approved during the May 2013 budget vote. Installed over



the summer of 2014, windows such as these are part of the District's long-term energy plan, which also includes planned lighting, boiler and temperature-control work. These improvements will enable the District to maintain an appropriate academic environment at less cost to the community.




to make their school year a positive and successful one, celebrated school unity and promoted a positive school atmosphere.

Howitt Middle School



11 FHS Students Selected for All-State and All-National Performing Groups

Only the most talented and accomplished performers are chosen to represent their schools in All-State or All-National performing groups. This year, 11 Farmingdale High School student musicians – 8 ensemble and 3 alternates – were selected to join the prestigious groups based on their New York State School Music Association (NYSSMA) solo performances. Sponsored by NYSSMA, the annual festival features students playing a prepared piece and being rated by judges. Student candidates are judged on every aspect of performance, including tone quality, technique, musicianship, interpretation, musicality, dynamics and sight-reading.

Selection to All-State and All-National Performing groups is a considerable accomplishment; it speaks volumes to the dedication of our students and their teachers. Congratulations to all of our selected students.



As Teams Soar on the Field, FHS Is Named Scholar/Athlete School of Distinction for 5th Consecutive Year

Exciting things have been happening on and off the field for Farmingdale's student athletes. In what is being called one of the most exciting games in recent memory, the FHS Dalers recently defeated Freeport in a hard-fought, intense game by a score of 37-34. With the score all tied at 34 as regulation ended, the Dalers drove down the field for the winning field goal in overtime to the delight of the home crowd. The victory for the Dalers was a huge win coming a week after a disappointing loss at home to Baldwin. The Dalers completed the regular season with a huge win over Valley Stream Central (35-0) resulting in an overall record for the season of seven wins and one loss.
