#### CAMPUS TRANSFORMED

#### Summer Capital Improvements Unveiled to Rave Reviews

If you stopped by the grounds at Howitt Middle School, you've probably noticed the large-scale transformation at the campus courtyard. Indeed, it would be hard to miss; brand new walkways, a new lawn, raised garden beds, additional wheelchair ramps, heated walkways, security gates and new academic learning areas—mostly completed over the summer and ready to go by the first day of school. The result of this work is a courtyard area that is much safer, more open and more aesthetically pleasing. Transitioning from one class to another through this courtyard is easier than ever before, and more work is on the way. By winter, the District hopes to add a canopy system that will allow for easy mobility during the colder months. Also completed during the summer months was the refurbished entrance at Farmingdale High School. Similar to the middle school, these changes create a safer and more open environment for our students.

It wasn't just the middle school that saw capital improvements during the summer. Nearly 150 classrooms districtwide were the recipients of various energy-performance projects. Many classrooms were completely renovated—new ceilings and ceiling lights, redone floors and repainted walls. Additionally, the work was performed as part of the energy-performance projects, which came at no additional cost to the taxpayer; all the work was paid using money the District saved with its lighting replacement initiative.

The work is part of the District's belief that by continually improving the facilities and grounds at schools, students receive a better educational experience. The initial response from the community has been very positive. Thank you for your support and patience during the construction process. 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# Farmingdale Schools and the Community Join Together to Read Award-Winning Book

It did not take long for *Wonder*, the 2012 novel by author R.J. Palacio, to become a literary phenomenon. Children (and adults) around the country were instantly moved by the book's powerful message of acceptance, by the way R.J. Palacio so artfully represented the hopes and fears that all young people experience. Over the fall, *Wonder* came to Farmingdale, as participating students in every school in the District are reading the book and working on several activities and projects that more deeply explore the themes, conflicts and characters.

The districtwide project is supported every step of the way by the Farmingdale Public Library. Extra copies of the book were added to every branch—both in schools and in the community—and book-sharing programs are set in place, enabling all those who wish to read the books an easy opportunity to do so. Over the course of the extended project, readers will be able to share their thoughts and opinions using the hashtags #DalerWonder and #DalerKind. The District will hold a World Café on Saturday, February 27, 2016, an event at which students, parents, teachers and community members will have the opportunity to come together and discuss this powerful book, and what the act of kindness meant to them.

A winner of a multitude of Literary Awards, *Wonder* tells the story of 10-year-old Auggie Pullman, who suffers from a rare facial deformity, and his challenges as he navigates his first year in a public school. The book is distinct in that it tells the story from the point of view of Auggie and other characters, including the bully. This provides a variety of voices and perspectives, enabling readers to more fully understand and empathize with the decisions each character makes.



# A Message From Your Board of Education

Over the summer, we also held a Technology and Learning Camp for educators in the District. The camp afforded our teachers the opportunity to learn about the constantly changing technology in use in our schools, how to incorporate these electronics into their classrooms, and how to best use these new tools in their day-to-day lesson planning. By having the best-available technology, and by training our educators to use it properly and efficiently, we enhance the educational experience for all of our students.

We value your involvement and input, and we ask that all parents and other community members become and remain active in District meetings, committees and events. We encourage you to get to know your children's teachers and participate in monthly PTA and Board of Education meetings, all of which are listed on the District calendar. # 12 FHS Students Selected for All-State and All-National Performing Groups

To be invited to perform at a New York State School Music Association (NYSSMA) All-State festival or a National Association for Music Education (NAfME) All-National festival is a prestigious honor for a young music student and the school district they represent. This year, Farmingdale School District was honored to have 12 students—7 ensemble and 5 alternates—to a festival as part of an All-State or All-National performing group. It is truly a representation of the ability of the students and the quality of the music education they receive in Farmingdale.

NYSSMA sponsors an annual festival at which students play a prepared piece and receive a rating. Students are judged on every aspect of performance, including tone quality, technique, musicianship, interpretation, musicality, dynamics and sight-reading ability. When students reach tenth grade, they become eligible to compete for the All-State and All-National auditions if they have achieved outstanding proficiency. The competition is very rigorous because students from across every county of New York compete against each other for All-State, and students from every state in the country compete for All-National. These students perform a piece for an adjudicator who issues a score and evaluation form. Privately the judges make a recommendation to the state and national committees. Students also need recommendations from their ensemble director, music administrator and high school principal.

Only the most talented and accomplished performers are chosen. Students receive their music in early October and must have it completely learned for the October All-National conference in Nashville or the December NYSSMA conference in Rochester. They arrive at each conference and have intense rehearsals for three days, culminating in the concerts. We couldn't be more proud of our students for receiving this prestigious honor.

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# Congratulations to Coach Buddy Krummenacker! Member of the Inaugural Class of Nassau County's Athletic Hall of Fame



Last spring, Nassau County Executive Ed Mangano and the Nassau County Public High School Athletic Association established the Nassau County Athletic Hall of Fame and released its inaugural list of inductees. On that list was Farmingdale's own football coach, Buddy Krummenacker. Last month, a ceremony was held honoring the inductees.

A FHS class of '65 graduate, Buddy Krummenacker began coaching at his alma mater in 1993, capturing seven county titles. During his career, which also included a head-coaching position at Hempstead High School, Coach Krummenacker led his teams to five conference championships and five Rutgers Cups. He was also a five-time winner of the Nassau County Football Coach of the Year Award. Coach Krummenacker's induction into the Nassau County Athletic Hall of Fame is a deserving tribute to a wonderful career.

The Hall of Fame—a privately-funded endeavor—was created to recognize, preserve and promote the heritage of interscholastic sports in Nassau County. It will be located in the newly renovated/reconstructed Nassau Coliseum!
