Brian graduated with an advanced Regents diploma and is looking forward to attending Vanderbilt University in the fall.



## • For the third consecutive year, Farmingdale's varsity athletic teams earned the Team Scholar-Athlete Award. As Congratulations York State!

- athletic teams earned the Team Scholar-Athlete Award. As such, Farmingdale is recognized as a *School of Distinction* and will be presented with the award and certificate in September by the New York State Athletic Association. This award is given only to schools in which all varsity teams earn an average of 90 percent or better.
- At an awards ceremony in June, the community granted scholarships to 191 graduating seniors, totaling approximately \$97,550.
- The Farmingdale High School Science Olympiad Team competed in the New York State competition for the first time in school history. While in Buffalo, students Brian Entwistle and James Keenan earned a first-place medal in the Water Quality Competition. Additionally, Robert Brienza and Nakul Gupta earned a sixth-place medal in the Math and General Science Knowledge Competition.

- Congratulations to our students, some of the best in New York State!
- Though many school districts from all over New York State competed in the Olympics of the Visual Arts Competition, Farmingdale High School placed first in photography, painting and fashion. The team received the *Most Creative* Award in the industrial design and architecture category.
- Fifteen performing groups displayed their talents at the NYSSMA Large Organization Festival at Hofstra in May. Farmingdale students received 13 gold awards, including two with distinction, and two silver awards.
- In the Nassau County Transportation Poster Contest, Farmingdale won first place in both the Kindergartengrade 2 category and the grades 6-8 category. The District tied for first place in the grades 3-5 category.

### Saltzman East Memorial Team Stands Out at Odyssey of the Mind World Finals

Saltzman East Memorial Elementary School's fifth grade team placed in the top half in the 33rd Annual Odyssey of the Mind World Finals this May, and was recognized as the most creative team on the national and state levels. The only team to represent Long Island, the Saltzman East Memorial group traveled to Iowa State University to compete against approximately 20,000 students from across the U.S., and from countries as distant as Japan, China, Poland, Germany, India, Indonesia, Singapore and Mexico. The Odyssey of the Mind competition is organized by Creative Opportunities Unlimited (COU), which affords students opportunities to meet National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) astronauts and attend NASA conferences and workshops.

### What's Happening in Our Schools...



### Albany Avenue

In June, Albany Avenue celebrated the completion of the third year of its Ambassador Program, which matches fifth grade ambassadors with their peers on the autism spectrum. This year, 64 ambassadors completed the program and received medals and certificates of honor. Albany Avenue ambassadors are nominated to participate in the program based on their maturity, empathy, kindness and dedication; those who accept are trained for five weeks with a special education teacher and the school psychologist before being matched with a child with autism. During their recess periods, pairs of student-ambassadors interact with each autistic child. In addition, the ambassadors share their knowledge and experience with their classmates, helping them to be more understanding and empathetic toward those with autism. This program has been an enormous success for all Albany Avenue students. Congratulations to our new ambassadors!

### Northside

In May, second grade students at Northside participated in the *Math Minds* Competition, a two-part interactive event designed and coordinated by math coach Jackie Wedner. In part one, each class picked four student representatives to speedily and accurately respond to mental-math problems. Part two featured 10 second grade students who completed a *Pieces of the Grid* puzzle in their classroom; these students worked toward the same goal of being both fast and accurate. This competition used approaches modeled in the Singapore Math program; the forum gave students the opportunity to display their knowledge and be commended for their excellent problem solving.



### Saltzman East Memorial

With the implementation of the Singapore Math model in our District's curriculum, students have been acquiring more skills in mental math and computation, as well as mastering math concepts, through hands-on learning. Saltzman East Memorial has been immersed in Singapore Math strategies throughout the year, and the children have been gaining a deeper understanding of the topics being taught. Students have been working in teams to solve problems daily; teamwork has made learning more fun, and everyone has enjoyed refining their mathematical reasoning skills. Teachers meet with students to discuss different approaches to solving a problem, and all possible solutions are displayed to show how students think differently. Students at SEM are showing a positive response to the hands-on approach, and they have grown tremendously throughout the year.

### Woodward Parkway

Kindergarten students from Woodward Parkway took a field trip to Howitt Middle School to participate in the *Literacy to Life* event. The kindergarteners spent the day with eighth grade students from Annmarie Ingenito's home and career skills classes, and Howitt librarian Jennifer Bleicher read *Walter the Baker* by Eric Carle. Afterward, the eighth graders developed engaging activities based on the book, including a puppet show, pretzel play dough and pretzel "twister." The kindergarten children constructed pretzel-marshmallow towers and enjoyed coloring, playing baker bingo and learning about kitchen supplies in the baker's kitchen equipment lesson. The event was a great learning experience for both the older and younger students, and everyone had fun in the process.






#### Howitt Middle School

In May, Howitt Middle School sixth graders celebrated the completion of their fascinating science projects. During the Sixth Grade Evening Science Fair, students were immersed in the creative process of experimentation and problem solving using the scientific method. The vision of the science fair is to provide students with fresh and innovative ways to think about science using a variety of new skills and practices learned throughout the year. Over a two month process, Ms. Pound's, Ms. LaRosa's and Mr. Marzilier's science classes developed projects that were designed and executed solely by the students. Students conducted experiments to solve a problem or design a prototype that could be integrated for use in a real-world application. Over 150 sixth graders presented their work during the fair and answered questions from an audience of over 200 guests. The students were stewards of their own progress as they learned to drive a long-term project from concept to fruition.



#### Dalers Reign Triumphant at the Olympics of Visual Arts

This year, Farmingdale middle and high school students earned nine awards at the Olympics of the Visual Arts (OVA) competition in Saratoga. Among those participating from across New York State, Farmingdale's ten teams combined their talents to win the most awards in the OVA competition in District history. High School students were awarded first place in the *Fashion*, *Photography* and *Drawing* categories, second place in the *Illustration* and *Sculpture* categories, and third place and *Most Creative* in the *Industrial Design* and *Architecture* categories. Howitt Middle School students were awarded second place in the *Illustration* category.

The OVA program provides an opportunity for students to participate in individual and group artistic problem solving. A new series of problems is posed at the beginning of each school year; students create long-range artistic solutions and travel to Saratoga to compete during a day-long celebration of creativity.
