Science. Outside of the classroom, Elijah is a member of Farmingdale High School's National Honor Society chapter and captain of the school's Environmental Competition Team. He was also a member of the school's Science Olympiad and Mathletes teams, and has been actively involved in martial arts and music in the community. Elijah will attend Yale University in the fall to study astrophysics.

With a GPA of over 105, Leah Ragno is one of Farmingdale High School's Class of 2014 valedictorians. Leah was a vital member of the school's Science Olympiad Team, Environthon program and marching band. In addition, she was inducted into the National Honor Society and

the French Honor Society. Leah interned at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York City for four years, where she served as a patient representative and assisted in patient escort services. She also volunteered for the Maria Regina Innkeepers and Mary Brennan Inn Soup Kitchen organizations. Leah will attend the University of Pennsylvania in the fall to pursue a career in medicine.

With a GPA of 104.858, Farmingdale High School's Class of 2014 salutatorian Minhal Ahmed is admired by his peers and teachers for both his humility and motivation. He earned a score of 5, the highest score possible, on all of his Advanced Placement exams. During the 2013-14 school

year, Minhal also qualified as a National Merit Scholarship finalist. Outside the classroom, he was an avid participant in the school's Science Bowl team, Science Olympiad and Mathlete programs. In addition, Minhal has volunteered his time to tutor his fellow classmates in math and physics, and volunteers at the Nassau University Medical Center and his local library. Minhal will attend Northeastern University in the fall to study bioengineering.

### Liz Garavuso Retires After 20 Years



Partings are, by nature, bittersweet. While we are excited for what lies ahead, we are also sad to say goodbye to those we are leaving behind. The end of the 2013-14 school year is especially poignant, because we're saying goodbye to a principal who has been positively affecting the lives of Farmingdale students for two decades. Elizabeth "Liz" Garavuso retired as principal of Northside Elementary School at the completion of the school year after holding the position for the last 20 years. During her time, she helped ensure that more than 3,000 students received the highest quality education possible.

During her tenure, Ms. Garavuso played a vital role in assisting her staff teach the District's curriculum to the students in a positive and encouraging learning environment. Over the years, she has recommended 67 teachers, 54 teacher aides, 12 custodians, two secretaries and one nurse for positions at Northside. In addition, she has worked for three District superintendents and for more than 25 board members. Ms. Garavuso and her husband, Gary, plan to settle in upstate New York for their retirement.

## What's Happening in Our Schools

#### Albany Avenue Elementary School

The end of each school year is marked by final exams and field trips, graduation ceremonies and family get-togethers. Albany Avenue Elementary School has a special year-end tradition of its own: the school gathers 450 students, teachers and family members and heads to a Long Island Ducks minor-league



baseball game. In an annual excursion aimed at building community and celebrating the year's accomplishments, Albany Avenue's trip to Bethpage Park is an event the school looks forward to throughout the year. It offers a chance to reflect on the prior school year and gear up for the summer ahead. #### Northside Elementary School

A new math museum has opened at Northside Elementary School! It's called the *Place Value Museum*, and it's under the direction of the school's math coach, Jackie Wedner. The museum assists children in learning various mathematical concepts and number sense.



A group of kindergarteners broke in the new exhibits, spending about ten minutes

examining the many displays. After visiting the museum, the students returned to the classroom, where they were abuzz with excitement. Their teacher engaged the children by having them work on shared-writing activities, where they wrote about their experiences in the *Place Value Museum*. The activity perfectly melded with Common Core initiatives, as it streamlined ELA and math lessons into one assignment. ### Saltzman East Memorial Elementary School

STEM initiatives continues to be stressed at all grade levels, it's increasingly important that students learn how to conduct research. Third graders at Saltzman East Memorial Elementary School are getting a leg up: they recently researched animals and created reports based on their findings. The

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students conducted their research and designed their projects in the computer lab. The topics they studied included the animals' appearance, diet, habitat, life cycle and defense mechanisms. The research projects helped the children prepare for their field trip to the Bronx Zoo, where they were very excited to see up-close the animals they had been studying.

#### Woodward Parkway Elementary School

History came alive on stage at **Woodward Parkway Elementary Schoo**l as fourth graders put on an outstanding performance of the play *The European Explorers of the New World*. For months leading up to the performance, the students researched the Age of Exploration. They learned how monarchs from Spain, France, Portugal and England engaged in an intensive exploration of the world in search of treasures

such as spices, silk and gold. During the show, students assumed roles of famous explorers including Ferdinand Magellan, Amerigo Vespucci and Sir Francis Drake. Congratulations to all those involved in this wonderful performance!



#### Howitt Middle School

Community outreach and social responsibility are pillars of public education. It's how students take the lessons they learn in their core classes and apply them to the world. This is particularly true at **Howitt**Middle School, where for six years, eighth graders have been holding their annual Dance

Marathon, an event that raises thousands of dollars in food and donations for a local charity.



At the beginning of the school year, students research various charities and vote on which charity they will support. The students spend the entire school year educating themselves, the school and the community about the organization. This year, Howitt students selected Friends of Karen, a local nonprofit organization that serves New York families with children, birth to age 21, who have been diagnosed with life-threatening illnesses. Each year, students create an original logo and slogan related to the selected charity, and they design a t-shirt, write lyrics to a popular melody, and choreograph a line dance that reflects their commitment to the organization. The year-long program culminates in the Marathon, a five-hour show featuring dancing, music, food, games and team-building activities. All told, this year's Dance Marathon raised almost \$8,000!


### Farmingdale High School

## Farmingdale Named One of the Best Music Education Communities

Each year, the NAMM Foundation – a nonprofit organization supported in part by the National Association of Music Merchants – reviews thousands of surveys from school districts across the country. From those thousands, a select few are recognized with the prestigious Best Communities in Music Education designation. This award signifies that a district recognizes the importance of a strong music education.

"These schools and districts make a strong commitment to music education," said NAMM Foundation Executive Director Mary Luehrsen. "And they understand the essential value of the well-rounded education it provides for every child." This year, Farmingdale School District was one of only 376 districts nationwide (out of 2,000 that applied) to receive the honor.

In order to be considered for the award, Farmingdale administrators and teachers had to answer an extensive survey with questions about funding, graduation requirements, music-class participation, instruction time, credentials of music teachers, facilities and more. Receiving the award serves as a testament to the commitment to music education displayed by all members of the Farmingdale community. Students, teachers, administrators, parents, community leaders – all of them played a major part in Farmingdale winning this award, and we are extremely grateful and proud.

## Checking In On Our Spring Sports

Every season, the Dalers of Farmingdale make our community proud, and the 2014 spring season was no exception. In addition to every varsity team being named a Scholar-Athlete Team, our athletes had great success on the field as well. Read below for more detailed information on each of our varsity teams.

- \* Baseball and Softball: Both teams completed their seasons and held a "senior send-off" at their last home game.
- **Varsity Badminton:** The Lady Dalers hosted Great Neck North in the first round of the playoffs.
- \* Golf: The reigning conference champion Dalers headed back to the Nassau County Championships, held at Bethpage State Park. The Dalers once again had an impressive showing, but just missed repeating as champions, finishing in second place.
- \* Boys' Lacrosse: In the first round of playoff action, the Dalers defeated Oceanside at Hofstra by a score of 12-6! After the victory, the boys' lacrosse team played Massapequa in the semi-final round, where they came up short despite a strong start.
- Girls' Lacrosse: As a result of their successful regular season campaign, the Lady Dalers completed their regular season with a bye in the first round of the Nassau County Championships, which were held at Adelphi University. And true to form, the Lady Dalers won the County title for the ninth consecutive year! They went on to the Long Island Championship to play West Islip, where after a hard-fought contest, they came up just short. That won't put a din on their success, however; the Lady Dalers lacrosse team continues to set the standard for the region.
- Tennis: The varsity boys weathered a spate of early rain outs to complete a successful season. The following four Dalers represented the District in the county tournament: Robert Mattia (12th grade), Steven Lensky (12th grade), Suraj Muralidharan (10th grade) and David Ammendola (8th grade).
- **Boys' Track:** This team does not disappoint! The Dalers completed their regular season as Conference Champions. Their next stop was in Syosset, where they earned the Division Champions title! They headed on to the Nassau County Championships, earning the County Runners-Up title. Nico Fratto was named county champ in the discus and 200 meters, and Nader Golshahr was named county champ in the pole vault. The competitions were not over yet for the Dalers; they competed in the state qualifiers and sent six athletes to the New York State Championship.
- ❖ Girls' Track: The Lady Dalers participated in two very long days at the Nassau County Championships, culminating with Khadia Jenkins placing 3rd in the shot put and the high jump, and Kelsea Thompson being name County Champ in the long jump and triple jump! Last week, the team competed in the state qualifying meet and once again Kelsea triumphed this time in the 110 meter high hurdles.
