Farmingdale Incorporates Common Core Standards to Help Every Student Succeed

In accordance with New York State's Common Core standards, all districts statewide must ensure that classroom instruction and curricular materials at the elementary, middle and high school levels abide by the six new English language arts (ELA) and literacy standards. The New York State Board of Regents recently approved these changes, proposed at the national level, along with changes to the mathematics standards. An enhanced set of pre-kindergarten standards has also been adopted by the Board of Regents. These shifts to the Core Curriculum are designed to ensure that students are receiving an education based on a consistent core curriculum from grade to grade and from school to school. Consistent standards will provide appropriate benchmarks for all students nationwide.

The ELA/Literacy Common Core standards, implemented in New York State last January, will assist Farmingdale students in acquiring the skills necessary to be proficient in college and in their professional careers. In addition to ensuring that all students benefit from a consistent curriculum, the new elements of the standards also require increased complexity in content and skills at each grade level, from kindergarten through grade 12. The K-12 standards define, for each grade, what students are expected to learn and be able to do at the end of each school year. The cumulative progression from one grade to the next will enable students to meet college and career readiness expectations by the end of high school.

Because the elementary level classroom is where children begin learning to think globally, it is imperative that they are exposed to a wide range of texts in science, social studies, literature and the arts. To accomplish this, the new additions to the ELA/literacy standards for students in pre-kindergarten through grade five call for increased informational reading in these subject areas. Half of our students' reading time in these grades will be devoted to informational texts that enable them to gain a global perspective.

Common Core shifts affecting students in grades 6-12 are aimed at developing higher-order thinking skills. To achieve this, teachers of subjects other than ELA will emphasize literacy experiences in their planning and instruction. In science and social studies classrooms, students will be expected to make inferences and learn from what they are reading, rather than simply referring to the text in their classroom discussions, homework and exams.

Other shifts in the Core Curriculum include the expectation that students will engage in rich and rigorous discussion based on a common text, will be able to develop written arguments that rely on evidence, and will develop vocabulary

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and understanding appropriate to the texts they are reading. Vocabulary from grade to grade will focus less on esoteric literary terms and more on helping students develop greater comprehension of practical words they will need to understand and use in order to progress. These shifts all require teachers to adapt their lessons in such a way that students will have both the time and the necessary assistance to achieve the expectations. Teachers will allow more time and space in the curriculum for close and careful reading, and will provide the support necessary for those students who may need additional help in grasping the materials.

Another shift in the Common Core is what has been termed a "staircase of complexity"; each grade level represents a step of growth on the staircase. In all classrooms at every grade level, instruction will be developed around central texts appropriate to the students' levels to enable them to make the step up to the next grade.

Farmingdale teachers are focusing their classroom instruction on reaching new heights for every student, and together with administrators and support staff, will use the District's best resources to ensure that students transition from each learning level with the skill sets necessary to excel.

Superintendent's Conference Day

Tuesday, May 1, 2012, has been chosen as the date for a Superintendent's Conference Day for grades K-8. Elementary and middle schools will be closed for students that day. Staff will report to score state assessments. High School students will have a regular day of school.

A Message From Your Board of Education

We hope you all had a wonderful holiday season, and wish each of you a healthy and productive new year. January is a month of fresh beginnings, and we look forward to seeing progress throughout our District on many fronts.

Farmingdale administrators and Board of Education members have begun work on the 2012-13 budget proposal. A primary consideration in planning for this budget is the New York State property tax levy cap instituted this past June, which will take effect in the 2012-13 school year. The tax cap will limit annual increases in school districts' property tax collections to approximately 2 percent, or the rate of inflation, whichever is lower. The actual percentage varies from district to district, because it is contingent upon a number of different factors.

It is important to understand that the cap applies strictly to revenue raised through property taxes – the portion of the budget on which residents will pay taxes (the tax levy). A portion of the total budget is covered through state aid, various reserve funds and the District's appropriated fund balance. However, public schools continue to face rising costs, many of which are statemandated. This includes health insurance and retirement fund contributions for school employees.

Because of the tax levy cap for the 2012-13 school year, the Board of Education has many decisions to make in preparing next year's budget to be proposed to the public on **May 15, 2012.**

At the Board of Education's meeting in December, the tax levy cap was explained, and we strongly encourage community members to continue voicing their opinions about the programs within the District. To further discuss tax cap related concerns and next year's budget, the Board invites the public to participate in the following meetings:

Farmingdale High School Boys' Lacrosse Coach Honored as National Coach-of-the-Year

Lacrosse coach Bob Hartranft has been selected as the inaugural coach-of-the-year by the National Interscholastic Lacrosse Coaches Association (NILCA). The award was presented during the high school coaches meeting on Saturday, December 3, at the Baltimore Marriott Waterfront Hotel.

Coach Hartranft has been at the helm of the varsity program at Farmingdale High School for the past 43 years. This past June, the Dalers won their first-ever New York State Class A championship, marking the first time since 1986 that a Class A team from Nassau County took that honor.

Highlights of Coach Hartranft's career include 654 wins (second in New York State to Mike Messere), 37 consecutive non-losing seasons (1975-2011), 37 consecutive playoff appearances (1975-2011), 21 consecutive semifinal appearances (the longest streak in Nassau County history), 13 Nassau County championships and 32 All-Americans.

The Coach-of-the-Year Award will be presented annually to an individual selected by the NILCA Awards Committee from coaches who have been nominated by their peers. National nominations are accepted each year, and recipients will receive the award during the annual NILCA membership meeting each December.


